The first half term back at the Academy has been exceptionally positive. I am thrilled to report that we have numerous achievements to celebrate in this short period, including:

Student Attendance: Our student attendance rate is consistently above the national average and continues to improve.

Students' Attitudes to Learning: In the last month alone, we've awarded over 20,000 positive points to students for their exemplary attitudes towards learning.

Star of the Day Awards: We have recognised and rewarded 115 students with the "Star of the Day" awards.

Extra-Curricular Engagement: On average, we have had 300 students participating in at least one before or after-school club every week this term.

Our primary focus remains on supporting students to achieve their full potential. We kindly request that parents and carers regularly engage their child in discussions about what they are learning in class, especially concerning vocabulary acquisition.

Our commitment to providing an enriching extra-curricular experience for students remains a top priority. We have introduced several enhancements during break and lunch times, such as:

Extended Break and Lunch: Students in Year 8 through Year 11 now have an additional 5 minutes, while Year 7 students enjoy an extra 15 minutes for break and lunch.

Cross-Year Friendships: All students have break and lunch at the same time, allowing them to socialise with friends from different year groups.

Improved Amenities: We have increased seating options and food stations to ensure students have more time to relax and enjoy their meals.

Diverse Club Offerings: A wide range of clubs, including Basketball, Chess, IT, Arts, Sports, Movie, Table Tennis and more, are available for students to explore their interests.

As winter approaches, we would like to remind you that all students can access a complimentary breakfast from 7:45am each morning at the Courtyard Cafe. We offer a selection of cereals, bagels, and hot chocolate for students to enjoy before their school day begins.


MORE NEWS



Plant cell

Chloroplast is a structure in plants cells that contains chlorophyll for photosynthesis. Many chloroplasts

Vacuole is a space within the cytoplasm of a cell which contains fluid or cell sap. The vacuole will increase in size when a plant cell takes in water.

Cell wall is a rigid layer surrounding some cells. The structure gives the cell strength and support, which prevents the plant cell from bursting when they take in water.

These can contract and relax to move the ribcage, changing the size of the chest cavity.

The diaphragm can contract and relax to change the size of the chest cavity where the lungs are.




